PSHSRE policy been updated, incorporating the new SRE legislation guidance, by PSHSRE Lead and Inclusion team. It has been shared with parents and policy has been validated.

Pupil Premium and SEND

- Identify needs of PP and SEND and adapt the lesson to support them e.g.: with an adult or small group work (e.g. social skills intervention or transition work).
- SENCo has worked with Year 6 teacher /parents of autistic children on sex education due to their vulnerability.
- Developing communication skills, vocabulary, strategies and confidence to help identify manage these challenges is crucial.
 For example, teachers adapt topics and scaffold learning based on current class challenges. This has included changing the order of topics taught.
- Opportunities for all PP + SEND are involved and represented. Lessons are interactive (One decision visual resources and targeted books that have been chosen with the school cohort in mind)
